ENGLISH

What will my child learn this term?

- Students will primarily focus on reading and writing for TPS Certificate or Functional Skills exams. Our key theme is The Planet. Examples of areas of study may be the documentary 'Between a Rock and a Hard Place' and researching the work of Greta Thunberg. They will complete activities related to this in the style of TPS Certificate and Functional Skills reading and writing papers. This will include fiction and nonfiction writing, reviews, emails, letters, notes and reports
- In the second half of term students will read a variety of poetry which may include WW1 poetry by Wilfred Owen and In Flanders Fields by John McCrae. Activities will continue to be in the style of TPS Certificate and Functional Skills reading and writing papers

How will they be assessed?

- Students will be assessed each lesson through observation and questioning
- In the first term they will be formally assessed in reading, spelling and writing to check what they have remembered from last year

Key words: pollution, autobiography, fiction, non-fiction, poetry, empathy, war, remembrance

- Read with your child for at least 10 minutes every night
- Practise individual spelling with your child each night
- Write a letter or email to a family member about what they have been doing at school
- Watch other documentaries together about the planet
- Talk with your child about war and remembrance
- Watch the remembrance service on TV (better still go to one!)
- Research the significance of the poppy and make your own following a YouTube clip or paper instructions

MATHS

What will my child learn this term?

- **Geometry:** Name 2D and 3D shapes and their properties. Identify lines of symmetry with shapes and patterns. Use reflective symmetry. Use positional vocabulary, place positive and negative coordinates on a graph
- **Measures/Time:** Units of measurement, length, distance, weight, capacity. Months of the Year, time to 5-minute intervals on digital and analogue clocks. Word problems relating to time
- **Number/Money:** Place value, read and write numbers in figures and words, addition, subtraction, multiplication and division including word problems

How will they be assessed?

- Both schemes of learning will be assessed through an end of module assessment
- Maths Age assessments will also be carried out during the summer term
- Students will also take modules of the Entry Level AQA and some students may take Level 1 Award in Number and Measures

Key words: Sides, edges, vertices, faces, symmetry, lines of symmetry, axis, reflect, left, right, between, inside, outside, in the middle, below, under, above, on top of, forward, backwards, horizontal, vertical, diagonal, parallel, perpendicular, coordinates, clockwise and anti-clockwise. Length, distance, weight, capacity. Seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months, years, ones, tens, hundreds, thousands, digit, more than, less than

- Encourage them to complete homework set
- Ensure they know their MyMaths login
- Talk about what they did in the lesson

SCIENCE

What will my child learn this term?

- This term the focus is on Chemistry
- Autumn 1: Atomic Structure, Periodic Table, Molecular Bonding, States of Matter
- Autumn 2: Properties of materials, Reversible and Non-Reversible changes, Separation methods, Reactivity Series

How will they be assessed?

- Autumn 1: Entry Level Exam Chemistry 1A Atoms, Compounds and States of Matter
- Autumn 2: Entry Level Exam Chemistry 1B Mixtures and separation methods
- Autumn 1 & 2: BTEC Unit Exploring Chemistry

Key words:

- Autumn 1: Atom, Nucleus, Proton, Electron, Neutron, Shells, Periodic Table, Metals and Non-Metals, Groups, Rows, Atomic Number, Atomic charge, Atomic Bonds, Covalent, Ionic, Metallic, Free flowing electrons, States of Matter, Solid, Liquid, Gas, Melting, Boiling, Condensing, Freezing
- Autumn 2: Pure substances, Mixed substances, Acids and alkalis, Filtration, Distillation, Evaporation, Chromatography & Electrolysis, Metal extraction, Reactivity, Oxidation and Reduction, Manufacturing, Natural, Synthetic, Polymers

How can I support them with my learning?

- Discuss and practice key words
- Revise Key concepts
- BBC bitesize
- Oak Academy online

ART & DESIGN

What will my child learn this term?

• They will be introduced to the GCSE Art & Design programme and will conduct some initial research into the theme of 'Natural Forms' and they will then produce a series of observational studies exploring a range of media and techniques

How will they be assessed?

• Class work is continuously assessed and group critiques take place regularly, progress will be reviewed at Half term

Key words: formal elements- line, shape, colour, tone, pattern, texture

How can I support them with their learning?

• To ask about their work and to encourage work to be taken home if possible and further refined or any outstanding tasks completed

HISTORY

What will my child learn this term?

- Treaty of Versailles Main clauses and the impact of the treaty on Germany
- Weimar Germany Challenges for the Weimar republic and the Stresemann years
- Nazi Dictatorship How Hitler got into power and how life changed for women and children in Nazi Germany. Groups that challenged the Nazis

How will they be assessed?

- Content will be assessed through completion of the exam script for the topic
- History skills will be assessed during activities in the lesson where they will have a chance to independently put skills into practice

Key words: Treaty, demilitarisation, reparations, hyperinflation, Stresemann, Night of the Long Knives, propaganda, Edelweiss Pirates, Hitler Youth and League of German Maidens

How can I support them with their learning?

- Look up what the keywords mean and practice using them in a sentence
- Talk about what they did in the lesson
- Do further research on the person they choose to write their biography about

COMMUNICATION SKILLS

What will my child learn this term?

- Memory strategies (recap, a 'ways to remember' sheet can be found in their diary)
- Feelings and strategies linked to Zones of Regulation (recap)
- What is communication? Verbal versus non-verbal communication
- Questions and requests knowing the difference and using and responding in functional situations (a station, a shop, restaurant/café, on the street asking for directions) (this supports the Entry level English speaking and listening)

How will they be assessed?

- Via the DINTs and responses in lessons
- Through their responses to any learning tasks used in lessons, which is recorded in their books

Key words: regulated, dysregulated, verbal, non-verbal body language, eye contact, facial expression, gesture, posture, tone, expression, braille, question, request

How can I support them with their learning?

• Take all opportunities to use a memory strategy and to support their listening and turn taking skills. Use and identify non-verbal communication, practice using a confident, assertive tone when speaking. Encourage them to ask questions and make requests at home and when out shopping etc and notice when they have done so. Support any home learning

PREPARATION FOR ADULTHOOD

What will my child learn this term?

- The importance and meaning of teamwork and the different skills involved
- How to use teamwork skills in within a team task
- The importance of teamwork in different jobs

How will they be assessed?

- Do it now tasks at the beginning of the lesson aid recall from previous lessons
- Teacher observations of skills during lesson
- Self-assessment of skills

Key words: Communication, listening, reliability, respect, delegating, organisation, supportive, trustworthy, resilient

How can I support them with their learning?

- Play team games at home
- Share household chores, work as a team
- Cook together

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

What will my child learn this term?

- The importance of a breakfast in a healthy diet
- Cooking eggs in different ways
- Other breakfast or snack dishes including pancakes and smoothies
- Baking for Macmillan Coffee Morning

How will they be assessed?

- Do it now tasks at the start of each lesson to assess recall from previous sessions
- Observation and questioning by teacher and TAs
- Practical task and quiz at the end of term for BTEC students
- Completion of module tasks for Foodwise students

Key words: Free Range, scrambled, fried, poached, omelette, proteins, whisking

- Talk to them about dishes they have made at school
- Encourage them to make breakfast for themselves and others at home

PE

What will my child learn this term?

- Fitness testing to measure flexibility, strength, power, agility, coordination, stamina and balance
- Tennis coaching at Woking Tennis Club (each PE group on a rota basis)
- Invasion Games to include football, netball, basketball
- Focus on elements within the games such as passing, attacking, defending, getting into space
- KS4 students are given a choice of which activities they do in PE lessons
- Leadership Opportunities through PE

How will they be assessed?

- As well as focussing on the specific skills within each activity that we cover in PE, all students will be assessed through the Head (cognitive application), Heart (character development) and Hands (physical application) programme
- In the Autumn Term, we will focus on and assess our students on the following assessment themes: Working with others / Identifying & Solving Problems / Acquiring New Skills / Developing New Skills / Self-Confidence / Making Decisions

- Talk about what they did in the lesson
- Look at examples of these sports activities on the TV, on the internet
- Watch or join in activities at outside clubs or at your local sports park
- Practise the key skills for each activity with your son or daughter
- Encourage your child to be active and participate in physical activity, particularly by using local sports facilities
- Practice key words above and use them in sentences

IT

What will my child learn this term?

- To use a variety of software programs
- To use images to support information within a document

How will they be assessed?

- By an end of term assessment paper
- In class observation and feedback

Key words: Software package, images, load, save, adapt, manipulate, resize, position

- Help them complete any set homework
- Do some online research about how to make an interesting online presentation
- Discuss the keywords above

Drama

What will my child learn this term?

- This half term, Year 10 students will continue to work towards the Arts Award by developing short scenes and performing them in our Christmas production. This will provide evidence for the Participate in an Arts Event section of the Arts Award. They will be watching extracts from "A Christmas Carol" by Charles Dickens and will use these as stimuli for developing their own scenes based on the text. They will also have the opportunity to watch and review a pantomime, which will also count towards the Arts Award
- The Drama skills they will be developing will include: improvisation, making suggestions for the writing and staging of a scene and for their own lines and actions, learning lines and actions, adding expression to their lines and continuing to develop their range of facial and vocal expressions, writing reflectively about their own and others' performances as evidence for the accreditation, writing reflectively about a theatrical performance

How will they be assessed?

- Drama assessment takes the form of our Flight Path Tracker assessment system and also individual Drama reports, which are updated every half term
- At Key Stage 4, students are also assessed according to the Arts Award criteria

Key words: Improvisation, Facial expressions, Staging, Props, Vocal expression, Body language, Reflection, Scenery, Special effects

How can I support them with my learning?

• Please help your child learn their lines and cues if they bring home a script later in the term and encourage them to discuss their role within the scene

EQUIPMENT

Part of developing self-organisation skills involves being prepared for lessons. Students should learn to check that they have the correct items with them daily. This will help them work towards a high standard of presentation as well as developing a sense of responsibility and an appreciation of school resources.

We request a pencil case (with student's name on it) containing a basic set of:

- Handwriting pen (fibre tip not a ball point)
- Pencil
- Eraser
- Ruler
- Glue stick
- Pencil sharpener
- Highlighter pen
- Coloured pencils

Students are expected to bring a named water bottle to use throughout the day.

TOP TIPS TO SUPPORT COMMUNICATION

- 1. Speak slowly and clearly to your child. This will help your child to speak slowly and clearly too. This will also help them understand.
- 2. Encourage your child to say when they have not understood something.
- 3. When your child says something incorrectly, say it back to them correctly, e.g. child says "I play on the puter", adult says "You want to play on the computer".
- 4. Explain what longer words mean.
- 5. Tell your child when you are joking or being sarcastic.
- 6. If you use a saying like "You're on fire today!" or "I'm over the moon" check they understand what you mean.
- 7. Explain words with more than one meaning, e.g. "pair" and "pear".
- 8. Help your child understand how to act in different social situations.
- 9. Talk to your child about the dangers of using sites such as 'Facebook', as it is likely they will not understand the risks of sharing personal information with people they don't know well or when talking with others online.
